MODULE ASSIGNMENTS Each module there is a 60 problem set, discussion, or data exercise (or a combination thereof) assignment. There will be twelve (12) Assignments in total, and the lowest of these will be dropped from your final grade calculation. Budget around 2 hours per module assessment.

PROBLEM SETS Problem sets will include a combination of multiple choice, calculations, and short answer questions and will be open book and open notes. Take these seriously to prepare for exams. Problem Sets are due Sunday midnight and credit is awarded only when completed by the due date.

Data exercises will require you to manipulate and interpret data related to economic issues. These data exercises will be accessed through Canvas, Econ Low Down or FRED. The exercises are due by Sunday midnight.

Discussions will occur asynchronously; I will post a discussion question and respond to the questions at your convenience prior to the due date. The discussion post will need to be completed by Friday midnight and peer evaluation will be due Sunday midnight. 7 (r) - 5 .
