Course Description:

Economics 3818 provides an introduction to statistics with emphasis on both theory and applications. We will study basic statistical concepts and techniques, and introduce its applications to a variety of practical problems. We will utilize Microsoft Excel for the data analysis in this course. Excel is available in all campus computer labs, including the lab in the basement of the Economics building. In addition to using Excel, you will need a two variable graphing calculator that has functions for correlation, mean, standard deviation, and least squares regression line. The TI-83 or TI-84 calculator is strongly recommended. This calculator will be necessary for in-class exercises as well as for exams.

Text: The Basic Practice of Statistics, (4th edition) by David S. Moore.
